## Clamshell mode supported MacBooks

- On MacBook Air, 13-inch MacBook Pro, iMac, and Mac mini, you can connect one external display using either of the Thunderbolt/USB 4 ports.
- On the iMac, you can connect to either of the ports with the Thunderbolt symbol.

## Accessories required

- External Monitor
- Keyboard and mouse
- Thunderbolt cable
- Thunderbolt to HDMI converter

## How to connect MacBook to monitor while lid closed

If you have never done this in the past, here are some simple steps you can perform to connect your MacBook to clamshell mode.

1. Make sure you've plugged in your **MacBook for charging**. Using clamshell mode is almost impossible without connecting the adapter to your Mac.
2. **Connect your MacBook and external monitor** with a Thunderbolt cable.
3. Then **connect a keyboard and a mouse to your MacBook**. The keyboard and mouse could be either wired or wireless.
4. Now once you have got things set up and the MacBook's screen is displayed on the external monitor, just **close the MacBook's lid**.

Voila! You're set.

If you don't already have everything set up, here are the things you will need to do before using your MacBook in clamshell mode:

Connect your external monitor using the appropriate cables for your MacBook (or hub). After connecting your external monitor, your monitor may prompt you to choose a few settings.

For better monitor setup and to make changes in display preferences, go to **System Preferences** → **Displays**.
